




Florida Virtual School Enrollment

All students who enter high school in the 2019-2020 school year must complete one course through online learning in order to earn a State of Florida diploma.

Track Your Progress Towards Bright Futures Eligibility

BRIGHT FUTURES EVALUATION

The FloridaShines Bright Futures Scholarship Eligibility Evaluation measures a student's progress toward meeting the requirements of a Bright Futures Scholarship. Scholarship amounts vary based on GPA, college entrance exam scores, community service bours, and other factors. The evaluation is based on information received from the student's school district and the Florida Department of Education. Any public high school student may use this free online evaluation.

To get started:

- 1. Go to www.FloridaShines.org
- 2. Under the "Go to College" icon, select "Pay for College"
- 3. Follow the information for Bright Futures Scholarships
- When prompted, log in with the school district, student's last name, and the Student identifier Number (SIN). The SNI may be a 10-digit number assigned by the school or the student's SSN, followed by an X Org., 1234567900.
- Once logged in, simply choose a scholarship level (e.g., Florida Medallion Scholars) from the "My Progress" section to display an evaluation of eligibility for that scholarship level.

On the right is a quick guide to interpreting the evaluation results. Students are encouraged to verify the results of the evaluation with their high school's Guidance office.







General Information

The School District of Manatee County (SDMC) is responsible for the archiving of student permanent records of former and alumni SDMC students. SDMC is now offering a convenient and secure website for former students, attorneys and corporations to request student records online.

Per District policy and the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) student records are only available to those who have authorization from the student or parent, guardian or responsible person if the student is under 18 years of age. If the student is 18 years of age or older, school records will not be released to a parent, guardian, or responsible person without the student's written consent.

Important Information:

- Students <u>must</u> upload a copy of a valid ID (unexpired Drivers License, state-issued ID, or U.S. Passport <u>only</u>). If a valid ID is not available, students must submit a notarized identity Verification form found at https://www.manateeschools.net/Domain/2419
- If requesting Career Prep records, please list <u>all Career Prep programs</u> in the 'Special instructions' box on the form.
- . Third-party requestors must upload a copy of the student's signed release.
- All records requests are filled electronically whenever possible.
- Please allow 2-3 business days for processing transcript requests. Other record types may require additional time.
- . Please allow up to two weeks to receive any records that are mailed.
- For schools that have closed, please contact our office to verify that we have records BEFORE ordering.
- You will receive emails from scribOnline@scribsoft.com to notify you of the status of your order. It is important you read those emails carefully as additional information may be required to process your request.
