(excluding any grades earned during middle school or through FLVS or Edgenuity)

23,184 Grades divided amongst 4 Counselors

5,796 Grades per Counselor

What are my graduation requirements?

- An unweighted cumulative GPA of 2.0 or higher
- 24 credits in specific content areas
- A passing score on the Grade 10
 FAST ELA and a passing score on the Algebra 1 EOC or appropriate concordant score(s)

Note: Participation in EOCs for Geometry, Biology, and US History will count as 30% of the final grade for each course.



What are the required 24 credits?

For High School Graduation:

- 4 credits in English
- 4 credits in Math (including Algebra I and Geometry)
- 3 credits in Equally Rigorous Science (including Biology)
- 3 credits in Social Studies
- HOPE or (2+ years of ROTC or 2+ years of JV/Varsity sport)
- 1 credit in a Fine Art
- 8 credits in Electives

Not Required but Strongly Recommended

- Two consecutive years of a Foreign Language
- Algebra II or other higher level Math courses
- ACT or SAT Tests
- Community Service Hours

Grade 10 FAST ELA Requirement

Students who entered high school in the 2020-2021 school year are required to pass the Grade 10 FAST ELA assessment.

Students may also earn a concordant score on either the ACT, SAT or CLT (Classic Learning Test) to meet this requirement.

What scores meet this requirement?

CLT	36 Verbal Reasoning and Grammar

Algebra 1 EOC Requirement

Students who entered high school in the 2020-2021 school year are required to pass the Algebra 1 EOC assessment.

Students may use a concordant score on the Geometry EOC, ACT, PSAT, SAT or CLT (Classic Learning Test) to meet this requirement.

Diploma Designations

Scholar Diploma

In addition to earning the standard 24 credits, a student must also:

- Pass the Geometry EOC
- Earn a credit in Algebra 2
- Earn 1 credit in Statistics or another equally rigorous math course
- Pass the Biology EOC
- Earn 1 credit in Physics or Chemistry
- Earn 1 credit in a course equally rigorous to Physics or Chemistry
- Pass the US History EOC
- Earn 2 credits in a Foreign Language
- Earn at least 1 credit in an AP, IB, AICE, or DE class

Merit Diploma

In addition to meeting the standard high school diploma requirements, a student must also:






How do I send transcripts to colleges?

Step 1 - Sign up for updates!

Join our community service group on Remind101 and I'll let you know when you're project is approved and you can begin work. The community service class code is Coming Soon.

Step 2 - Complete the pre-approval process.

Download the Service Approval Request Form.

Turn in the application to Mrs. Hedgepeth in Student Services. Please allow 24 hours for processing. If your project takes place over the summer, please bring the form to the front office during business hours. You may also email your form to hedgepethy@manateeschools.net. Do not begin your project until it has been approved, or your hours will not count toward Bright Futures.

Step 3 - Log your hours and complete the evaluation.

Download the Service Log & Evaluation Form.

Bring the completed form to Mrs. Hedgepeth in Student Services at the conclusion of your project.

Remember, the evaluation has to be filled out in order to receive Bright Futures hours.

"But WAIT! I'm doing community service as part of a group. What should I do?"

Your sponsor will turn in an approval request for the entire group. The project will be assigned a number. Check with your sponsor for the group code and put it on the top of your log / evaluation sheet.





Bright Futures Information



Q: When can students apply for the Bright Futures Program?

A: Student can apply as early as <u>October 1st of their senior year</u> but no later than August 31st after their graduation date.

Q: How do students apply for Bright Futures?

A: Students apply online at

https://www.floridastudentfinancialaidsg.org/SAPHome/SAPHome?url=home

Q: Do students have to meet all the requirements before applying for Bright Futures?

A: No, students can apply even if they do not meet all the requirements. All of the requirements must be met by the time of graduation except for ACT/SAT/CLT test scores.

Q: Why aren't my test scores listed on my Bright Futures report?

A: SAT, ACT and CLT scores must be sent to one of Florida's 12 state universities so that the Bright Futures program can access the report.

Additional Information

According to the Bright Futures Initial Eligibility Handbook:

- Advanced Placement, Honors, and Dual Enrollment are weighted as 0.50 per year in GPA calculation.
- Students may use up to two additional academic courses listed above to raise GPA.
- ACT, SAT or CLT (Classic Learning Test) may be taken an unlimited number of times through August 31st of graduation year.
- If a student does not apply by the deadline, the student cannot receive the scholarship!
