

MHS Juniors – Class of 2026 – Plan for your future!

Juniors should begin planning *now* for their future. What type of post-secondary education is right for you? What career path interests you? What education is needed for that career?

Students have many options and should begin researching and planning during their junior year. This allows students to take the right steps to achieve their goals.



Post-Secondary Options:

4-year college or University

Students planning to apply to a 4-year college or university must research the admissions criteria for each school. Visit the college websites to learn about admission criteria, deadlines, majors offered, size, location, student life and cost of attendance. Students should be prepared to submit applications to 4-year colleges/universities at the beginning of their senior year. It is recommended to apply to 4-6 colleges so that students have options. Students are strongly encouraged to visit their top choices before senior year.

State Colleges/Community Colleges

Many students decide to attend a state or community college like State College of Florida. State colleges award Associate of Arts (AA) degrees, Associate of Science (AS) degrees and many offer a limited number of 4-year Bachelor's degrees. The AA degree is a pathway to then transfer to a 4-year university to obtain a Bachelor's degree. This is called the "2+2" program. AS degrees are designed to provide technical skills to move into a career.

Technical College

Technical colleges, like Manatee Technical College, train students for a variety of career fields such as automotive service technology, carpentry, cosmetology, dental assisting, nursing assistant and digital design. Many of these programs can be completed in less than one year.



Military

Serving our country in the armed forces is also an option for high school graduates. Whether it



is the Army, Navy, Air Force, Marines or Coast Guard, students interested should talk with recruiters and understand the criteria and commitment to enlist. The Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery (ASVAB) test is required for students interested in the military and may be offered in the spring.

Junior year is the time to research your options!

FALL 2024

- 1. **Visit the Class of 2026 Schoology page weekly**. (on Schoology, click "Courses" then look for the class page; on the Class of 2026 page, click "<u>Updates</u>" on the left side menu). Important information will be posted here, so stay informed.
- 2. Learn about college options. Attend college fairs in person or virtually.
- 3. Take rigorous academic courses in which you can be successful and work hard to make high grades. Doing so will prepare you for college or careers.
- 4. Take the PSAT in **October 2024** (See Mr. Gage for registration information). It is excellent practice and can help guide your preparation for the SAT. The PSAT junior year is the National Merit Qualifying Test!
- 5. Explore career options using Xello. You can access Xello via your SSO look for the Xello tile. More information about Xello and other career exploration resources are on the College and Career Center page of the MHS website.
- 6. **Register to take the SAT, ACT and/or CLT** in December/January/February and throughout the spring. Fee waivers are available for qualifying students. We recommend students take both tests once to see how you score on each. Use those results to determine which test to take again to improve your scores. Most students take these tests 2-3 times, starting second semester of junior year.
- 7. Check your Florida Bright Futures status -are you on track to earn the scholarship? Go to www.floridastudentfinancialaid.org/ssfad/bf (click on "Bright Futures Scholarship" on the right) to see requirements.

WINTER/SPRING

- 1. **Take the SAT, ACT and/or CLT**. Prepare for the tests. Check out free, on-line practice from the testing agencies.
- 2. Attend the MHS College Night for Juniors January 16, 2025 6:30pm in the MHS Davis Theater to learn more about what you can do *now* to prepare for college.
- Continue to research prospective colleges. Learn about their admissions requirements and application deadlines.
- 4. Consider AP, honors and/or dual enrollment classes when registering for your senior year classes. It is important to keep up the rigor of your curriculum in your senior year while maintaining a balance so you don't overload! Talk to your school counselor about options.
- 5. Begin creating your college resume including all your high school achievements (clubs, sports, honors, etc.)
- 6. **Visit college campuses in person or virtually**. Take an official campus tour to learn more about the school and what they offer. Many colleges host in person and/or virtual open houses/admission information sessions.

SUMMER

- 1. Visit colleges. Sign up on their websites for an official visit.
- 2. <u>Prepare your resume</u> all activities, clubs, sports, work, honors, volunteer service, etc. that you've done in high school. This information will be needed as part of the college applications.
- 3. Begin writing your **college essay**. Check the websites of the colleges you are interested in to see what their essay questions are. The essay allows you to tell the college about yourself. A great essay will present a personal and compelling view of you to the admissions staff.

College Entrance Exams

SAT and ACT

Students must register online to take the SAT and/or ACT. Students create an account and follow the directions to register for a test. **There are registration deadlines, so plan ahead**. Your SAT and/or ACT account is also where you will check for your scores. Be aware of registration deadlines.

Fee Waivers for the SAT and ACT tests are available from school counselors for qualified students. Students may use the fee waiver for 2 SAT tests and 4 ACT tests. SAT – once you use the initial waiver, the second waiver will automatically post on your College Board account. For the SAT, students may also request a waiver directly through their College Board account. ACT – see counselor for waivers.

CLT

The CLT is now used by Florida Public Universities (and a limited number of colleges across the country) for admission, as well as Florida Bright Futures to meet the test score requirement. The CLT is a remotely proctored exam, all online, with specific technical/computer requirements. Students must register online by the deadlines. Check that the colleges you are interested in accept the CLT.

Fee waivers are given once students complete the CLT <u>Financial Assistance Request Form</u>. Only two per academic year may be granted.

PRACTICE! PRACTICE! PRACTICE!

Be sure to PREPARE for these college entrance exams! Students should study for these tests just like the preparation for any test. Carve out time each week to take practice tests, review study guides, quiz yourself on vocabulary, review math concepts, etc.

SAT

The SAT transitioned to a digital test in spring 2024. The College Board offers an abundance of free practice on their site, as well as more information about the digital exam. ACT

NOTE: When registering to take the SAT, ACT or CLT, be sure to request that your single sitting test scores be sent to one of Florida's public colleges or universities. Or make sure you have sent them scores after testing. That is how test scores are accessed for Florida Bright Futures scholarship evaluation.

The FASFA form should only be completed online at https://studentaid.ed.gov/sa/fafsa.

Community Service Hours (CSH)

Remember: Community Service Hours are NOT a requirement for graduation. They are, however, a requirement for the Bright Futures Scholarship.

The required forms and instructions for documenting community service hours or paid work hours for Bright Futures can be found on the Manatee High School website under "Parents and Students" and "Community Service Procedures."

Letters of Recommendation

There may be times when you might be asked for a letter of recommendation. The best place to start is with your teachers, past or present. Your teachers know you best, especially in regard to work ethic, time management skills, how well you work with others, special contributions/strengths, etc. There may be times when you are asked specifically for a letter of recommendation from your counselor. Whoever you ask, ask them in person and please give them 2 weeks notice. You will also need to provide a copy of who the letter is for, who it should be mailed to, give them a copy of your high school resume, and for Guidance we have an additional form we may ask you to fill out.

How to Schedule an Appointment with Your School Counselor

- 1. Come to the Guidance Office to pick up a Request for Guidance Appointment form.
- 2. Fill out both sides completely, especially your teachers' names and room numbers. There is a sheet in Guidance that has all the teachers' room numbers on it.
- 3. Put the form in the box that is outside your counselor's office.

Big Future Scholarships – A Clearer Path To College



The Big Future Scholarships guide you through the college planning process and offer you a chance to earn money for college for each action you complete. The more effort you put in, the more opportunities you have to earn a scholarship. Complete all six, and you are eligible to earn \$40,000. Scholarships will be awarded through monthly drawings to students who complete each action.

Paying For College

While most scholarships and financial aid applications cannot be completed until <u>senior</u> year, take time to understand the different sources of financial aid so that you are prepared for next year.

1 Federal Aid -- FAFSA

Complete the **FAFSA** – **Free Application for Federal Student Aid** at <u>www.FAFSA.gov</u>. The FAFSA is the *key* to federal grants (like the Pell Grant), federally backed student loans and work study. It is need-based aid. You can apply <u>OCTOBER of your senior year</u>. You will need federal tax information or tax returns. See the FAFSA website for details.

We encourage *all* families to complete the FAFSA even if you think you won't qualify, since colleges and many scholarships use information from the FAFSA to determine if you are eligible for their aid.

It is important to complete the FAFSA in October of senior year – be aware of deadlines each college may have.

2 State Aid – Florida Student Financial Aid

Seniors must complete the Florida Student Financial Aid application to be eligible for state aid, including **Florida Bright Futures**. Bright Futures provides scholarship money for students who will attend college in Florida. It is merit-based aid - eligibility is based on GPA, SAT/ACT scores **and** community service hours/work hours.

<u>Seniors must apply between October 1 and graduation</u> to be eligible. Go to <u>www.FloridaStudentFinancialAid.org/ssfad/bf/</u> to apply. <u>It is important that you know and understand the eligibility requirements!</u>

All students should apply-- even if they are not sure if they will qualify, if they are not considering going to college, are planning to go out of state, are taking a year off or are enlisting in the military. There are state grants in addition to Bright Futures for which you may be eligible. See details of eligibility requirements on the above website.

3 Institutional Aid

Check for scholarships at the college you will attend. Many offer scholarships through their financial aid office. Students may need to submit separate applications. Also, ask the specific department of the major you will be seeking to see if they offer any scholarships. Scholarships may be need-based and/or merit-based.

4 Private Scholarships

There are many national and local organizations that offer scholarships. Some are specific to a major, an ethnicity or require certain GPA/test scores, so students need to read each carefully for the eligibility requirements.
