The School District of Manatee County, Migrant Education Program will have a coordinated approach in supporting English Language Arts education for migrant students. At a high population migrant elementary school, a Migrant Resource Teacher will provide targeted assistance in ELA by providing small group instruction, as well as, professional development to assist teachers with ELA strategies to support ELA instruction in the classroom. Migrant Home School Liaisons will provide targeted assistance to migrant students based on Early Warning System data to assure students at elementary, middle and high schools are achieving academically. In addition, a Migrant Program Specialist will be provide ELA support to students, professional development to teachers, as well as, parent engagement strategies and information to parents. The MEP will also provide reading/literacy workshops to parents at before, during and after school students needing additional ELA support will be offered tutoring before and after extended day curriculum programs by providing certified teachers to provide ELA instruction and support. Transportation will be provided to those students attending the before or after extended day curriculum programs. A migrant summer school will provide ELA instruction by providing certified teachers and transportation to avoid the summer slide. The MEP summer programs is designed to provide supplemental ELA instruction and field experiences to build background knowledge.

Area of Focus 4: Out of School Youth

A. Describe how the LEA will address Out of School Youth in the Migrant Education Program.

The Migrant Out of School Youth in Manatee County are characterized by young men and women, mainly men, between the ages of 16 to 21 years old who are here to work. During the short agricultural season, eligible youth are identified and recruited into the Migrant Program. Migrant office staff, including the Recruiter, Migrant Advocate, and Home School Liaisons schedule ID&R canvassing sessions. In the evenings during this period, they cover all the camps, hotels and living areas of migrant workers and Out of School Youth who come to work in Manatee County. When identified as OSY by Migrant staff, MEP funds provide educational and health information and/or referrals. HSLs use needs assessment surveys to offer credit recovery programs such as HEP to identified credit recovery youths, but this is traditionally a very small subgroup. They also offer regular school entry information to those who may want to return to school. Eligible OSY respond in their surveys an interest in learning English. The Coordinator, Migrant Recruiter and other MEP staff offer OSY dictionaries and a mini-tutorial on how to use them. Additionally, OSY receive instruction in the use of computer and smartphones to access community resources, perform banking, and to access online English classes. Information and referrals regarding ESOL classes offered throughout the district is provided. Services provided to OSY, such as English classes, will be documented through registration lists and sign-in sheets.
